Introduction

The 2015 Ohio Homelessness Report: Abridged is the seventh statewide report on homelessness. This report provides a brief overview of statewide 2015 Point-in-Time (PIT) Count data on key items as well as comparisons to previous years' data. A summary of key findings can be found below.

A PIT Count is a statistically reliable, unduplicated count of homeless persons in a community, in sheltered or unsheltered locations, during one day. The numbers derived from a PIT Count do NOT represent the total number of people homeless during the course of the year – only those homeless on one day. Sheltered locations are considered to be emergency shelters, transitional housing programs (for homeless persons), or safe havens; and unsheltered locations include streets, cars, or other places not meant for human habitation.

Definitions

Continuums of Care (CoC) are local planning bodies responsible for coordinating the full range of homelessness services in a geographic area, which may cover a city, county, metropolitan area or an entire state.

Chronically homeless are homeless individuals with disabilities who have either been continuously homeless for a year or more or have experienced at least four episodes of homelessness in the last three years.

Chronically homeless people in families are people experiencing homelessness in families (with at least one adult and one child) in which the head of household has a disability and has either been continuously homeless for a year or more or has experienced at least four episodes of homelessness in the last three years.

Key Findings

Total Homelessness

 11,167 total people were homeless in Ohio in 2015, the smallest number recorded in the PIT Count since statewide reporting and analysis began in 2008. This represents a roughly 5.55% decrease in total homelessness between 2014 and 2015.

Family Homelessness

- 3618 people in households with dependent children (i.e., family households) were homeless in 2015, representing the smallest number in homeless families since tracking began in 2008. 2015 family homelessness numbers equate to a 12.19% decrease from 2014.
 - Two Ohio CoCs, Dayton/Kettering/Montgomery County and Youngstown/Mahoning experienced increases in family homelessness, with 52.4% and 196.67% increases reported, respectfully.

Chronic Homelessness

- 2015 chronically homeless numbers were the lowest reported since reporting began in 2008.
- In 2015, Ohio communities reported 1,245 chronically homeless in the PIT count, which represents a 14.04% decrease from 2014.
 - Toledo/Lucas and Cincinnati/Hamilton reported the largest declines in chronic homelessness with 60.75% and 36.9% decreases between 2014 and 2015, respectfully.
- Despite an overall decrease in chronic homelessness, two CoC's saw increases in number of chronically homeless: Cleveland/Cuyahoga 30.56% and Balance of State 5.32%.

Veteran Homelessness

- 1,183 sheltered and unsheltered homeless veterans were reported in Ohio's 2015 PIT Count, representing a 4.29% decrease from 2014.
- The largest increases in veteran homelessness were reported in Balance of State 20.95% and Canton/Massillon/Alliance/Stark 4%.
- Toledo/Lucas experienced the most significant decrease in homeless veterans 35.29% in 2015.
