MCKINNEY-VENTO HOMELESS ASSISTANCE SUBGRANT:

APPLICATIONS OPEN MARCH 4 - MARCH 29

The Ohio Department of Education and Workforce is excited to announce the launch of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Subgrant to support the needs of <u>students experiencing homelessness</u>. The McKinney-Vento subgrant includes 16 allowable uses including:

- The excess cost of transportation for students experiencing homelessness;
- Paying a staff member a stipend to fulfill the <u>roles and responsibilities of required district homeless</u> <u>education liaison</u>; and
- School supplies to support the academic and literacy needs of students experiencing homelessness.

The McKinney-Vento subgrant is a competitive process made available on a three-year cycle (fiscal years 2025-2027). All community schools and traditional public school districts are eligible to apply for McKinney-Vento subgrants. The application will be short, consisting of four questions, with the goal of reducing barriers for schools and districts to continue the meaningful work they started with <u>American Rescue Plan Homeless</u> funds.

Applications open March 4 in the Comprehensive Continuous Improvement Plan (CCIP) portal and the deadline to submit is March 29.

The Department recorded Bidder's Conferences for interested applicants. APPROACHING AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN DEADLINES

Time is running out for districts and community schools who are American Rescue Plan (ARP) Homeless I & II grantees to spend their funds. Grantees should expedite the spend down of these funds to support the immediate needs of students experiencing homelessness. There are many allowable uses of ARP funds that districts and community schools can consider, including:

- The purchase of school supplies
- The purchase of hygiene supplies
- Hotel/Motel or other emergency housing stays
- Professional development for school and district personnel;
- and more!


SCHOOLHOUSE CONNECTION SCHOLARSHIP

ADDRESSING THE DIGITAL DIVIDE:

The National Education

Technology Plan

In January, the U.S. Department of Education released the National Education Technology Plan (NETP): A Call to Action for Closing the Digital Access, Design and Use Divides. First released in 1994. NETP has been updated multiple times since its original release, most recently in 2016. The NETP examines the digital disparities that exist between students historically marginalized backgrounds and their peers. These disparities not only show up in the use and design of ed tech, but access to it as well. The report notes that teachers from well-resourced schools typically have more time and training to design lessons that involve creative, nonformulaic uses of ed tech. Divides in access to technologies remain a big problem, with students at wealthier schools and from more affluent families

tending have better internet connectivity and more reliable access to devices and digital learning materials. The report also offers ways that these digital divides can be mitigated, drawing on listening sessions with more than a thousand educators, students, parents, state and district leaders and advocacy organizations. The report's guidance includes encouraging districts incorporate practices of "universal design for learning," an approach based on developing tools that serve learners regardless of their learning preferences, abilities and backgrounds. It stresses that educators be flexible in terms of how they present content and engage students, and includes support for students with disabilities and those who are learning English. Districts should examine their current uses of implementing consider strategies for closing the digital divide.

HUD Data Shows Increases in Family and Youth Homelessness

In December, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) released the 2023 Annual Homeless Assessment Report Part I (AHAR). The report depicts an annual snapshot of the number of individuals in shelters, temporary housing, and in unsheltered settings. The report found more than 650,000 people were experiencing homelessness on a single night in January 2023, a 12% increase from 2022. For families with children and unaccompanied youth, these increases were even greater at 16% and 15% increases from the previous year, respectively.

Ohio Schools Seeing Growing Number of English Learners

Over the past two decades, the <u>number of English</u> learners in Ohio schools has doubled to more than 60,000 students. Immigrants tend to cluster around areas where other people speak the same language and share the same culture, and as a result, English learner populations are growing across the state. In Licking Heights, the Nepali population is skyrocketing, and in Parma, a suburb of Cleveland, it's Ukrainian refugees. These families face many challenges, from transportation to finding a job, that increase their risk of homelessness. In response to this increase in English learners, schools across the state are adapting to better support these families.

Big Changes Coming to the SAT: What Students Should Know

Starting in March, the SAT will be digital. The traditional paper-and-pencil format is no longer available, with rare exceptions for students with visual impairments, reading disabilities, or other documented challenges. This new format accompanies other changes to the test-takers experience, such as the exam adapting questions in the second half of the exam based on the student's performance in the first half. These changes have also resulted in the digital SAT being roughly an hour shorter than its last iteration. While some educators are optimistic about these changes, other have concerns about digital disparities.



MUSKINGUM/OHIO VALLEY ESC



In Muskingum Valley and its surrounding region, there is a strong need for drivers education programs. While some programs do exist, many have extended wait lists, are too far away, or too expensive for some students to afford. In response, the Muskingum Valley ESC set out to address this need by collaborating with the Ohio Valley ESC to create the Muskingum Ohio Valley ESC Driving School. This is an affordable program housed within partnering high schools and includes both instructional and behind the wheel training with certified instructors. To increase the equity of the program and expand its reach, the Muskingum Ohio Valley ESC Driving School partnered with Job and Family Services, who have committed to paying the full fee for income eligible students to complete the program. As a result, teens who might have faced financial and geographic barriers in obtaining their driver's license are able to do so affordably and locally. Having a driver's license expands opportunities for teens to join the workforce, further their education, or access support services. This program has, in turn, removed time and financial burdens for families and benefited local employers by creating a more prepared workforce.

Save the Date for the 2024 Housing Ohio Conference




New Resource: CoC-LEA-RHY Program Crosswalk
