## **Questions for state candidates**

**Homelessness:** The fact that nearly 11,000 Ohioans are experiencing homelessness on any given night is a stark reminder of the urgency with which we need to address this issue. As a state, we must adopt a comprehensive approach that focuses on prevention, rapid rehousing, and permanent supportive housing. We should prioritize funding for programs that keep people from becoming homeless in the first place, such as rental assistance and eviction prevention. Additionally, expanding access to mental health and substance abuse services is crucial, as these are often underlying factors contributing to homelessness. Collaboration between state, local governments, and non-profits is essential to ensure that resources are efficiently utilized to provide safe, stable housing for all Ohioans.

Housing Challenges in Rural Ohio: Housing insecurity in rural areas is indeed an often overlooked but significant issue. To address the unique challenges faced by these communities, we need to increase investment in rural infrastructure, including affordable housing development. The state can offer incentives for developers to build affordable housing in rural areas and provide more robust support for community land trusts, which help preserve affordable housing. We should also enhance funding for home repair programs that assist low-income homeowners in maintaining safe and livable homes.
